A Message From Pastor Josh

⁴ Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one. ⁵ Love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. ⁶ These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. ⁷ Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. ⁸ Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. ⁹ Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates. (Deuteronomy 6: 4-8 NIV)

Friends, Lent is a time of preparation as we move to the celebration of Easter. It is a time when we are encouraged to do an assessment of our spiritual lives. It is a time to clean out and confess the dark things that do not belong there. It is also a time to reorder, refill, and renew. As you take time to reflect on and assess the state of your life, I have an important question for you to consider. Is Jesus the center of your life or is he an add-on? At the outset, this question seems simple and straight forward. You might even be tempted to give a quick "yes" answer and then move on, but I am going to encourage you to really sit with this question for a while and think about the ramifications of the way you answer it.

When we go back and look at the scripture from Deuteronomy given above, we find that we are given the command to love God with our whole being. Have you ever really considered what that means? Does that mean that you can just bring a little bit of yourself to the relationship? Does it mean that you can offer just a little bit of your time, energy, and resources? No!! It means you must fully show up. It means that all your time, energy, and resources should be directed at God first. Now I can already hear some of the sighing, moaning, and grumbling. Your mind is whirling and telling you this is too much, this is too extreme, this is fanatical. But does the God who created the entire universe, the God that formed and breathed life into us really deserve any less?

Let's think about it a little differently. What do you really think it would be like to be one of Jesus's disciples? What do you think it would be like to listen to Jesus teach and preach every day? What would it be like talking and travelling with him? What would it be like to both witness and to participate in the miracles that he did? What would your conversations with family, friends, neighbors, and even strangers look like as you shared your experiences?

If I had to venture a guess, I suspect each of us would find our lives drastically changed. Our lives would look drastically different because Jesus would become the true center of our lives. You see, there is this idea that what you focus on expands. The more we immerse ourselves in a relationship with Jesus, the more likely we are to experience transformation and emulate him. The problem, however, is that many of us fail to keep Jesus at the center and we fail to live up to the ideal of loving God with all we are and all we have. In the busy lives we lead, it can be easy to relegate Jesus to a simple add-on to our lives when it is convenient. When this happens, it generally doesn't take long for our lives to begin to spin out of control. In fact, I would say that we are seeing the result of this on a macro level right now.

As I survey things from a macro level, it seems as if we are living in a nation and a world that is rapidly trying to remove God from the center place. In many places in the West, more and more nations are accepting and even celebrating their post-Christian identification. Each year we witness a continual rise in the number of people who identify as religious "none" and "done". Each year we watch churches who have served their communities for years

close their doors for good. At the same time all of this is happening, the world as we know it is becoming a more strange, chaotic, and violent place. I do not think that these things are mere coincidences. In fact, I might even argue that if this continues, we may find ourselves in an existential crisis.

Friends, I think it is time to push back on some of the trends! I think it is time for us as Christians to remember the identity and power we have in Christ. It is time to put God back in His proper place, at the center of our individual and corporate lives. It is time to reignite and fan the flame of Christ in our lives!

My dear friends, during this month of March I am going to encourage us to begin shifting the culture of our families, our churches, and our communities. It is time for us to live more fully into the command of loving God with all that we are and all that we have. We get to teach our children and grandchildren how to do the same. Now is the time to boldly begin sharing the gospel message of love and salvation EVERYWHERE! Now is the time for us, both as individuals and as a church, to live in a way in which the love of Christ is undeniable and His light flows through us into the dark places of our world.

I pray you take some time to truly wrestle with God on the original question during Lent. I pray the Holy Spirit moves each of you to greater levels of freedom and boldness. My spirit quickens as I ponder the transformation that will occur, both internally and externally, as we live into a heart fully committed to our God, the God of Abraham, Issac, and Jacob.


